January 1st is also my fifth month of ministerial partnership with you, and hasn't it been just marvelous? It feels like we are a good match, doesn't it?! The learning curve was steep at times, and adjusting to a new context and new collective chapter has required adjustments and defaulting to grace all around. With that said, I wholeheartedly believe that we are finding our pace in this communal dance (Cheers for mixed metaphors!). It sincerely floods my heart with joy when I hear that my presence here is not only tolerated or needed, but it is celebrated. And guess what... this is how I also feel about y'all (I'm from the deepest South America). I am profoundly grateful for having a chance to journey with you, SFUU as a vital entity in our region, and all the people doing justice work in our county. It is true that I need a job to pay my bills, and honor my family commitments. However, our work has been more than a job to me or a ministerial career move. The partnership we have is the fulfillment of a lifelong dream, and an amazingly nurturing context for spiritual growth. You have embodied hope to me, and I pray that I have offered you some degree of hope and encouragement as well.



I have been also privileged to have a chance to practice my passion for altarscapes, or the fancy term -visual homilies, or visual sermons. Homily and sermon are commonly defined as "a religious discourse that is intended primarily for spiritual edification rather than doctrinal instruction." However, another definition is "a tedious moralizing discourse" and that is something I want to avoid at all costs. Sermons are also often related to clericalism, or a practice reserved for professional clergy. That's why I prefer the term reflection. However, there is something to be said about using the term visual homily in order to lift up the practice of adorning the sanctuary above the practice of decorating a space. I have no desire to put down professional decorators and interior designers. I worked closely with those professionals in my previous career, and I do believe in the value of their craft. However, I try to distinguish their work from what I attempt in our sanctuary, in order to invite you into a deep reflection about our church environment on a week-to-week basis. How can the sanctuary space we occupy enhance your sensorial perception of "What Is", the Mystery, the Truth, and the possible Universal Harmony one might be able to tap into?

Builders of sacred spaces have pursued the art of capturing the ineffable into tangible forms since time immemorial. Sometimes these sacred atmospheric efforts have gone to opulent exaggerations, at times it has fallen into overly stark ambiance and unrelatable scale, or a dimension of religious experience completely neglected. As you might've noticed, I am a visual learner, and I find that visual aids are tools that need to be considered in order for one to communicate effectively. I share this information with you because there are/will be times when the main message may not come through spoken words of a reflection, or an inspiring reading, or the lyrics of an eloquent song, but through what you might capture through your other senses, sixth, and seventh senses included.

My main goal with Sunday Celebrations, Meditation Sessions, and other Practice Opportunities is that all of us find the bridge between theory and visceral experience. My hope is to encourage seekers to deepen their journey and inspire those who might not even be seeking anything to remain reflective and bodily engaged with what unfolds within and all around them.



How can SFUU Celebrations be more conducive to the growth of your spiritual/human journey? How can we continue to collaborate so SFUU can become an even more fertile ground for community spiritual/human development?

My office door is always open, and my phone is always on so we can reflect and enact your answers to the above questions and any other questions springing into your heart/mind/soul.

May 2022 be our most joyous and fruitful year yet!

All We Need is Love- and About \$70,000

We know our church building is about 100 years old, and our congregation purchased it in 2001. The roof on our church is surely not that old, but it's old enough that no one seems to know how old it is. What we **do** know is that we have been patching leaks for a long time, and we are overdue for a new roof. We have bids to do this job for around \$50,000, but we anticipate that some dry rot mitigation will be necessary after the old roof is torn off. This will add to the cost, and we don't know how much that will be.

Here is more bad news. We have two heating/air conditioning (HVAC) units that are about thirty years old. They still work, with a little repair work from time to time, but they are already well past their expected useful life. They are also far less energy-efficient than currently available equipment and are not capable of providing the kind of air flow and filtration system we need in the age of Covid. We could easily need to spend about \$15,000 to replace each one. Taking care of this before it becomes an emergency is advisable. (For those of us who have been around for a while, you may remember that a third HVAC system for the RE and office wing of the building was replaced a few years ago. The old units we need to replace are for the Sanctuary and Social Hall.)

Neither of these situations comes as a surprise to the leadership of SFUU, but the Board of Trustees has decided that now is the time to deal with them. We have a Chalice Lighter Grant request with the UU Pacific Central District which we hope might generate as much as \$4,000. We will be needing at least \$70,000 more, and our entire annual operating budget is a bit less than \$200,000. So this is a big deal. (cont'd on p 6)

Rooftop Solar Still Under Threat

Many of you signed petitions in advance of an early December meeting of the CA Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) regarding recommendations made by the utilities for

changes to its net energy metering program. They have since met, and their proposed decision includes much of what the utility companies were lobbying for, including a \$57 monthly fee for solar users and an 80% cut in the credit that solar owners get for sharing surplus solar energy with the grid. This new net-metering policy will go into effect on January 27th unless Governor Newsom steps in. Go to the Social Justice **Take Action** page to either call Gov-

Proper Disposal of Fats, Oils, and Grease

Did you know that fats, oils, and grease (FOG) should not be thrown directly in the trash (I didn't)? It turns out that FOG contaminates recyclables during waste disposal, so needs to be handled separately from your regular trash. You can call to have it picked up in many places, or you can take it yourself to the transfer station in Auburn, or to the Western Placer Waste Management Authority in Roseville.
