

PILLAR OF THE CHURCH AWARD

The highest honor that SFUU gives each year is called "The Pillar of the Church Award." The Board of Trustees has entrusted the selection of the awardee(s) to an ad hoc committee of the former Pillar award recipients. This Committee has established minimum criteria for the eligibility for the award as is stated in the following outline.

Minimum criteria for eligibility:

- 1. Must have been a member for at least 5 years
- 2. Must be a member in good standing Per bylaws
- 3. Has displayed a depth of service to SFUU
- 4. Has displayed a breadth of service to SFUU
- 5. Has demonstrated leadership in our congregation

The highest honor that SFUU gives each year is called "The Pillar of the Church Award." Per the Board of Trustees' direction, your active past pillars met in April to select the recipient of this year's award. To be eligible for this award, you must meet the criteria listed above.

Once you receive this award, your name goes on a plaque in the foyer of our church building and onto the Pillar's page on our website. Later, you get the joy of herding all the past pillars together to select the next year's pillar, AND then you get to bestow the mantle of 'pillarhood' to the selectee during our annual congregational meeting. The following is a synopsis of the accolades given to this years' recipient by SFUU's past pillars.

This year's well-deserved pillar's award goes to someone who worked tirelessly to help SFUU move forward during the pandemic. Early on, she spearheaded the *Way Forward Survey* in an effort in improve our connections and cope more smoothly with doing church while physically distanced. More recently she worked to make our virtual covenant groups a success. Both the survey and the covenant groups were critical activities for fostering a sense of community while remaining physically isolated from each other. In addition, she serves as a vital back-up zoom tech for our wonderful administrator, she sings in the virtual choir with a big inviting smile, and she is on a team that is fine-tuning our ability to stream our services as we move back to in-person church services. If you haven't figured it out yet, **Suzanne Borth** is this year's Pillar.

Beyond being a stand-out during this unusual year, Suzanne is an active member of the Board of Trustees, and a welcome contributor to worship. She is deeply connected to our UU principles; and wants everyone else to be too. She was a member of our stellar Search Committee, which brought both Reverend AJ and Reverend Alex to SFUU. She attacks all of her tasks with purpose, energy, and reliability. Several years ago, she brought the Coming of Age Program to SFUU, and did all of the logistic work for the teens and their families, including three weekends of out-of-town events involving youth from two other congregations. Yes, Suzanne has demonstrated, depth, breadth and leadership here at SFUU.

Suzanne's UU roots are deep, and she encourages others to explore the whole breadth of unitarian universalism (rather than solely the depth of SFUU). She was responsible for getting the word out about General Assembly and district-level meetings, and represented SFUU as a voting delegate last year at GA.

I have likely missed some or your other contributions, Suzanne. So, let me just say that we are immeasurably fortunate to be the beneficiaries of your energy, can-do attitude, and spiritual connection to Unitarian Universalism. Congratulations **Suzanne Borth**, Pillar of the Church.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Name: Board of Trustees

Chairperson and Members: Maureen Bauman, President, Marsha von Dessonneck, Vice President, Rick Marshall, Secretary, Geoff Smith, Finance Officer, Suzanne Borth, Rick Ross and John Bohland, Members at Large

Purpose: Responsible for overseeing the operations of the Congregation, review, and update policies, consider proposals, and manage SFUU Congregation funds.

How has your work served the Mission of SFUU this year? We have worked to make sure that the church remains consistent with our values, and we have programs that nourish the sprits of our members, care for the earth and support our work towards peace and justice. We commit to open and honest communication as a congregation and board.

How has your work helped more people connect to one another? The impact of COVID lasted longer than anyone anticipated, and we sorely missed contact with each other. Over the course of the year, despite regular online services, we noticed a zoom fatigue among members of all ages. Committees continued their work online with Adult Religious Education (ARE) taking a big role in facilitating multiple ways for members to connect.

Highlight this year's accomplishments: A survey was conducted early in the fiscal year to get input from our Congregation Members about ways they wanted to connect. As a result, ARE oversaw the implementation of multiple online groups including covenant groups, book groups, and social/discussion groups that had been previously held in person. Thirty percent of our members responded to the questionnaire and the variety of options allowed many people to be engaged.

The issues of COVID remained a huge concern through the year. Work began in 2021 to figure out how to enhance our system so we could "stream" our services when we at last returned to in-person services. This was a huge lift for a small group of people who worked tirelessly at figuring this out. At the same time a new COVID Task Force was constituted of members of the BOT to determine how we could return to services safely in the Fall. This included active listening to members and reaching out to each family with children unable to be vaccinated due to their age.

Most significantly, our newly called Minister, Rev Alex Van Tine, was forced to resign, at the end of his second year, in order to return to the east coast due to his wife's health issues. A Search Committee was quickly put together and consultation with UUA staff helped us to determine our next steps. The Search Committee determined a two-year contract minister was the best alternative, with the option of a sanctioned call process at the end of that time, if there was agreement with all parties. The Search Committee reviewed applicants, interviewed, and then joyously contracted with Rev Alex da Silva Souto.

Aspirations and Inspirations for next year: To work with our new minister, Rev Alex, to increase our presence in the community and through this effort increase the number of members in our congregation.

Share a favorite memory from your group's work this year: COVID conversations were hard, but we worked diligently to hear each other and strive to develop policies that everyone could support. One evening in particular we had quite a challenge but through the work of all present we came to a decision everyone could live with and support.

Any highlights in the wider congregational life? or partnerships with other folks in the congregation? The congregation clearly was ready to return to in-person services with many restrictions in place to achieve safety for all. It was joyous to realize that we had solid policies in place, that allowed a return to in-person services, despite the increase of illness in our community due to new variants.

Purpose: The purpose of the Membership Committee is to support people in finding a meaningful connection with SFUU through exploring the path to membership; attending worship; offering service through volunteering; and building and deepening relationships with this multigenerational community. The Committee's purpose is also to retain new members, allowing the congregation to grow and prosper.

How has your work served the Mission of SFUU this year?

We offered monthly, later weekly, opportunities for newcomers to Chat with the Minister following Zoom Sunday services. We sent greeting letters to people who filled out the newcomer link. We took attendance at Zoom Sunday services.

We educated ourselves on using Google Docs for committee business.

Working with the Stewardship Committee, we reviewed the list of Members and updated it for accuracy and completeness.

How has your work helped more people connect to one another?

We supported the pre-and post-church Zoom breakout rooms for discussion and socialization.

We kept an eye out for people we had not "seen" at Zoom church for awhile, and followed up as needed.

Highlight this year's accomplishments:

We completed an official Charter document for the Membership Committee, in line with the church's goal to standardize committee organization.

Aspirations and Inspirations for next year: We hope to gain and retain members for SFUU via a resumed, in-person Path to Membership program. We can do this by welcoming newcomers to in-person services, Saturday Suppers, and Chats with the Minister.

We will help to implement the smooth, safe return to in-person services by updating procedures and recruiting volunteer staff for Welcomers, and Open/Closers.

Share a favorite memory from your group's work this year:

Nothing comes to mind, except that it was fulfilling to "see" committee members once a month via Zoom.

Any highlights in the wider congregational life? or partnerships with other folks in the congregation?

Frankly this was an "annus horribilis" for Membership.. SFUU's main draw for membership is the welcoming, friendly nature of our community and this was difficult to execute with Zoom services. For the first time in SFUU's history, we welcomed zero new members during this fiscal year. Sadly, we lost several members to relocation and waning interest in online church.

Committee Purpose:

The purpose of the worship committee is to plan and present quality worship that is informational, inspirational, meaningful and transformational. The committee plans and presents worship services on Sundays when the ministers are away from the pulpit and supports the minister when they are in the pulpit. Additionally, we solicit and evaluate feedback from the congregation and make adjustments to improve the quality of services to meet and support the intentions and wishes of the membership. The worship committee directs and supports the Worship Associates and identifies a worship associate for each service where one is needed, along with providing training and support for all services areas.

How has your work served the Mission of SFUU this year?

We have served the Mission of SFUU this year in many ways. In our effort to build and maintain beloved community in this extraordinary year of pandemic, we have transitioned successfully to fully online services utilizing the zoom platform. Several members have developed skills to navigate our services seamlessly, most especially Vicky Jungers, Amy Evans and Suzanne Borth to whom we are most grateful. A benefit of this transition includes only one service at 10am which has allowed our members who have not previously shared service together to experience unity. Our facilitated meet and greet breakout sessions have allowed our members who have not previously socialized to get to know others in our community. We conducted 1 Worship

Training session this year, greatly expanding the skills and participation of our members in services. We have continued the use of Soul Matters resource packets and have enhanced coherence of our monthly themes as well as expanded access to beautifully curated readings, music and sermon themes. Our YRE team has been more active in services which has greatly enhanced our beloved community.

Highlight of this year's accomplishments:

As noted above, successful transition to online services, expansion of member participation in services and adoption of Soul Matters has highlighted this year for the Worship Committee.

What were this year's challenges/unmet needs of your board/committee/task force?

During this second year of pandemic, there have been many challenges such as remaining connected as a committee and with the congregation. Ongoing zoom technology and plans to transition to a live streaming format have been very difficult and time consuming. Other than transition to online services, we have experienced no significant challenges and continue to grow in strength and creativity.

Aspirations and Inspirations for next year for your committee/board/etc:

We will continue to connect with the congregation and membership of SFUU to solicit feedback on enhancing worship service during the coming year of zoom church. We also hope to include more members in service participation with reflections, special music, special projects and ideas/suggestions for service themes. The committee has aspirations to create more intergenerational connections and incorporation members from all ages to contribute to services. We will continue to hold annual Worship Training and support members who wish to begin taking a more active role in services as they develop Worship Associate skills- We have learned that as members contribute, they feel more connected to the community and to the Unitarian Universalist principles and social justice action.
